





SEND update

SEND Youth Council

Part-time timetables

The SEND Team receives regular queries regarding the use of part-time timetables and is aware that there are occasions where schools are considering their use for CYP with identified SEND needs. We would like to remind schools of the statuary DfE guidance to take into consideration when such decisions are made in agreement with parents as a short term support in **exceptional** circumstances.

The DfE guidance states the following: 'The law entitles every child of compulsory school age to an efficient, full-time education suitable to their age, aptitude, and any special educational need they may have... A part-time timetable should not be used to manage a pupil's behaviour...A part-time timetable must only be in place for the shortest time necessary and not be treated as a long-term solution'.

Both the national guidance and local guidance relating to expected processes must be considered and applied when making decisions:

Literacy Difficulties guidance

Following a task and finish group held in the autumn term attended by SENCos representing a range of schools, there has been a further review of the draft Literacy Difficulties Guidance. Due to this review, a further task and finish group is underway to ensure the guidance, which includes the MK position around 'Dyslexia', is easily accessible for all enabling understanding and improved practice on this area. SEND Strategy

We will shortly be publishing the Milton Keynes Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Strategy priority plans for the academic year 2023-2024. These plans are the joint responsibility of the SEND local area partnership, which includes education, health and social care services in Milton Keynes. The plans outline the improvements we want to make for children and young people with SEND in our area.

How many priority areas are there?

The plans reflect 5 priority areas: Inclusion, Specialist Provision for Complex Needs, Autism and Cooccurring Differences, Transitions and Preparing for Adulthood, and Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health.

How many times a year do the steering groups meet?

Each of the 5 priority areas has a steering group who meet twice a term to update about progress, and to plan next steps.

Who attends the steering group and what happens during the meetings?

These steering groups are made up of professionals from across education, health and social care, and they include parent and carer representatives from PACA MK and our schools. The steering groups ensure that progress is being made. They plan how to achieve the outcomes we want, and problem solve when things aren't progressing. The steering groups also ensure that plans for future work are driven

by our 'self-evaluation' – i.e. by what we know about ourselves and what our families and professionals are telling us about how it feels to be a child or young person with SEND in Milton Keynes.

Who do the steering groups report back to?

The 5 steering groups report back to the partnership four times per year, in a meeting called the SEND Strategic Partnership Board. This is chaired by the Director of Children's Services at MKCC, the Deputy Chief Nurse at BLMK ICB and the chair of PACA MK, and it's attended by senior representatives from education, health, social care.

What happens at the SEND Strategic Partnership Board?

At the meeting, the group review our progress against this plan. They also review data and information such as feedback or survey responses which the local area use to continually self-evaluate and ensure that our strategic improvement plans reflect the feedback that we receive.

The action plans that we publish shortly will outline:

What we're working on this is the top level outcomes that we want to achieve. Many of these describe areas that we expect to be working on for several years to bring continuous change and improvement for families.

Activities for this year these are some examples of the specific activities and projects that are taking place within this academic year.

How we'll measure success these are examples of the things that we'll be measuring to make sure that our work is making a difference to families.



SEND Inclusion Forum update

After the February half term break, following feedback from SENCos that pen portraits do not consistently accurately reflect the CYP being considered for assessment, a different system will be trialled for two half terms. To replace the pen portrait information, we shall we trialling the use of set structured questions at the start of your introduction to the child/young person which will be shared ahead of time within you invitation to attend the SEND Inclusion Forum. The questions will be similar information to the pen portrait information such as year group, attendance, main need/s etc. We shall be gathering feedback before moving into the final 6 weeks of the summer term.

High Needs Top Up Funding

The HNTUF guidance and processes are currently being reviewed and further updates on this will be shared following the half term break.

SENCo Quadrant Meetings Updates

Meetings for SENCo quadrants occur in the second week after each half term. The aim is to bring together SENCos and the SEND Team to address key themes and complete audits. Since the emphasis is on discussions, these sessions are not minuted, but essential actions and discussions are communicated through our SEND Update newsletter.

Agendas are agreed in collaboration with SENCO co- chairs a week before the meetings take place.

Quadrant summary of most recent meeting

A consistent theme shared through all the quadrant meetings was how to support the secondary SENCo representation in the meetings due to low secondary numbers. We will explore with SENCos if a secondary only meeting this academic year would be supportive.

North: SENCos found the EHC/SEN plan audits to be beneficial. There was an expressed interest in seeing examples of well-structured SEND Support Plans. Regarding the SENCO group, it has not been established yet, but plans were made to initiate this. The discussion mainly revolved around topics such as High Needs Top-Up Funding (HNTUF), trigger points, how things change over the year and looking at group provision.

East: The quadrant was well attended. The main item on the agenda was a problem solving activity led by Samantha Upchurch, Educational Psychologist. Colleagues enjoyed discussing suggestions and solutions and said they found it helpful. It was decided to develop this activity in future meetings.

South: SENCos discussed creating a transition template capturing pupil voice-secondary school led this and there was discussion around what this might contain. They are going to produce a document for next time to share. Some schools suggested that they would be interested in auditing - but concerns were shared as to burden of additional meetings. Concerns raised re: SEND Support Plans for secondaries, and referral routes into SEND Support

West: The discussion revolved around the local SENCo support groups and their current status. Feedback highlighted the challenge of scheduling meetings at a convenient time for everyone, leading to lower attendance rates. However, the main focus was on the Supervision information shared by the Educational Psychology Service, which all felt was beneficial. This information provided valuable insights into shaping conversations and effectively managing supervision sessions, whether among peers or within the school setting.

SEND Team Updates:

Specialist Teaching Team Updates

The Specialist Teaching Teams continue to receive a high demand for direct support with well over 100 children and young people allocated to team members every month. The SEND Team would like to remind settings/schools that when contacting the SEND Support Line for direct support, the graduated approach will have been applied to supporting the children/young people, this will ordinarily involve at least 2 cycles of APDR using a SEND Support Plan. Please also consider the use of advice for groups of pupils with similar needs rather than multiple requests for individual pupils to make the best use of the resource available.

In addition, when making an EHC needs assessment request, the locally agreed <u>assessment guidelines</u> to assess advise that external agency involvement will have ordinarily supported the APDR process for the children/young people, and does not relate specifically to the involvement of the Inclusion Specialist Teaching Team. If there is current external agency involvement, please note that the Specialist Teaching Team would not typically be involved during the same period as this can lead to multiple outcomes and potentially conflicting advice.

With national offer day for secondary places on the 1st March, we know that schools will be arranging conversations and transition plans between primary and secondary schools. Please find <u>transition advice and support</u> available on our SEND Local Offer.

Early Years Team

Our Early Years SENCo Meeting last month focused on how we might support groups of children with SEND in our early years settings- some of our providers shared how they are adjusting their offer to ensure that all children are included (eg: smaller story times with different resources for different ages/stages, and flexible use of sensory spaces).

We look forward to seeing as many early years providers as possible at our next SENCo Meeting on 07.03.24 at 17.00.

Assessment Team

With the majority of EHC need assessment requests continuing to be made by settings and schools (64% Sept – Dec '23) and a significant 33% increase overall in requests made during this autumn term '23 compared with autumn '22, we would like to remind settings and schools of the revised locally agreed EHC need assessment guidance to support with the right time to make requests. Within this guidance it advises that typically two terms of APDR information will be available at the time of the assessment request and that all outcomes have been reviewed.

Review Team

For annual reviews that have been held up until the end of January, 69% of paperwork has been received by the team within 2 weeks of the meeting date - thank you to all schools that have returned paperwork promptly as this enables us to keep up to date records for our CYP. We are processing paperwork as quickly as we can, however to further support the team please remember that the Annual Review Report must be returned with your recommended amendments, with the meeting date included. Update – Mental Health & Wellbeing services for Children & Young People in Milton Keynes

With it being Children's Mental Health week last week (w/b 5 February), we are pleased to announce the following updates to our mental health & wellbeing provision in Milton Keynes.

MK Wellbeing – A new service for young people in Milton Keynes

The MK Wellbeing service offers a safe space for young people to discuss their mental health & wellbeing. It aims to provide support at the earliest possible stage and intervention for those who may be feeling low, unhappy or sad. For example, confidence building, stress management skills and support to improve resilience.

MK Wellbeing is being delivered in collaboration between CNWL, Relate MK and Service Six. You can access the service or make a referral by emailing. Young people can also self-refer.

Young People Sanctuary for Milton Keynes

Mind's Young Person's Sanctuaries are safe, non-judgemental spaces where young people aged 14-17 can come if they find themselves in crisis or mental distress in the evenings. There is no need to call ahead or book an appointment. A young person can simply drop-in and they will be met by a trained youth mental health professional who will listen carefully and help identify ways to address the problems they are facing. The teams will also be able to refer and signpost to other services if required.

The sanctuary is now open at CAMHS Eaglestone Health Centre, Standing Way, Milton Keynes, MK6 5AZ. It is open from 5pm to 10pm on Wednesday, Thursday &

Fridays. It is also open on Saturday between 4pm and 10pm. For more information about the Sanctuary, please see the attached flyer and visit the local Mind website
